### Expectations that promote learning, wellbeing and safety in all public schools in Western Australia.

Student learning is strengthened when school staff, parents and carers are actively and positively involved in their education. We all share a responsibility for providing a safe, supportive and productive environment, free from bullying, harassment, discrimination and violence.

Parents and carers and other visitors to schools support safety by ensuring communication and conduct at school and school activities is respectful. Every student, staff member, parent or carer has the right to feel safe and be safe at our schools.

### What parents and carers should not expect from our schools

Our staff have families and personal lives too, and like all professionals, work at their best when they have a quality work-life balance. Parents and carers should not expect:

- school staff to return calls after work hours
- emails to be answered in the evenings or weekends
- access to teachers' private phone numbers or emails
- staff to meet with parents and carers, without an appointment, during a school day
- to be allowed on a school site if you have harassed or been aggressive towards school staff.

### You should contact your child's school if:

- you have concerns about your child's academic or social progress
- medical issues arise or diagnosis changes
- there are changes in family circumstances
- there are safety issues or changes in behaviour at home
- social issues arise that could impact the safety and welfare of students at the school
- you want to make or reschedule an appointment.

## Communication that interferes with teaching and learning

- speaking to staff disrespectfully or aggressively, especially in front of your child or other students
- expecting to meet with staff during the school day without an appointment
- visiting the classroom during the teacher's preparation time before school
- using social media platforms inappropriately and disrespectfully
- malicious or judgmental gossip
- By everyone playing a part in providing safe, positive learning environments and opportunities for our students, we enable them to be the best they can be.

### Communication methods

Electronic communication, such as email, is appropriate for short, non-urgent and positive forms of communication. It is not appropriate for more complex or emotional situations. In these cases, parents should request a face-to-face meeting so that issues can be given the time and attention they deserve. If in doubt, speak to your school.

### Concerns and complaints

Contact your school as early as possible if you have concerns. If you are not sure who to speak to, you can start with your child's teacher. For some matters, it may be appropriate to talk directly to your child's year coordinator, school administration staff or principal.

If you have approached your child's school but haven't been able to resolve the issue, refer to our complaints process to explore your options <u>education.wa.edu.au/complaints</u>.

Shared and respectful expectations and values will enable us to work together in the best interests of our children.
























































## Year 6 Emergency Services

## Using Elastik Data Attendance link to Education Gaps.

As a staff we have been deep diving into our assessment programs utilising Elastik which is a fantastic tool to pick out gaps and missing pieces of student's learning. Using the data we gathered from our assessments we can feed this into the Elastik programme and it can give us a breakdown across the school, across the classroom and across the individual student to tell us what gaps there are in the learning process.

An interesting side note was that when we analysed the data then matched the same data to when students were away, we were able to see a causal link.

This is hard data evidence to show just how important it is to be attending school every day, because if some of the content is missed in one year, we then build on that knowledge the following year putting the student behind.


To further support our students, we have worked very hard to develop a multi-tiered intervention program run by our Student Services Coordinator Katherine Hardegon and her team to support students that have been flagged for intervention. These students have individual programs created, and intervention provided to try and 'bridge the gaps'.

Again, we understand that holidays are an inevitable part and an invaluable experience for students but please be aware that if students are away consistently in the year, they will miss vast amounts of content and will be needing to continually play catch up.

As you can see in the diagram below, we have cross section of missing content for an individual student where content has been missed in previous years, and this then provides lessons and activities that we can use to either reteach or add to our daily reviews. The data provided can show the year concept, the strand, the skill and provides support strategies.

The next diagram is an example of a class cohort. We use the term 'big bubble, big trouble' and this links directly to areas of need for cohorts of students in the class. This allows our teachers to develop group education plans for students, or again to either revisit content or add it to their daily reviews.




Running Club Lap Championship

It's that time of year again – applications for enrolment of students entering Kindergarten, Pre-Primary and Year 7 or changing schools in the 2025 school year should be made by Friday 19 July 2024. 2025 Kindergarten and Pre-Primary Enrolments Parents and carers of students eligible for Kindergarten and Pre-Primary for 2025 are invited to come into the Administration Office to register their interest to collect an Application for Enrolment Form.

All Application for Enrolment documents should be returned to the Principal, Augusta Primary School, Administration Office before 4.00pm Friday 19 July 2024. I encourage parents and carers to use the chart above to help them identify if their child is eligible for 2025 enrolment.

**Kindergarten:** In 2025, we welcome Kindergarten students who were born from 1 July 2020 to 30 June 2021.

Following consultation with our community to identify the most effective way of providing our Kindergarten program to students, we enable our Kindergarten students to attend two and a half days every week.

### **Pre-Primary:**

Students born between 1 July 2019 to 30 June 2020 are eligible for their first compulsory year of schooling in Pre-Primary.

Parents and carers of our current Kindergarten students must complete the confirmation enrolment form sent home and review existing information about your child. We welcome new Pre-Primary students to complete an Application for Enrolment, along with their Birth Certificate and Immunisation Statement.

Year 1: With Pre-Primary now being the first year of compulsory schooling, it is no longer necessary for current Pre-primary families to apply to enrol for 2025 – all 2024 Pre-Primary student enrolments continue at Augusta PS for Year 1. Years 1-6: Application for Enrolment for students who are not currently attending Augusta PS and wish to attend in 2025 are now also being accepted.

## Together, we make a difference.

### Communicating well

School communities thrive on open communication wherein staff, students, and parents and carers have opportunities to share good news, discuss issues and maintain an ongoing dialogue.

Principals and school staff communicate with parents and carers in a variety of inclusive ways that are reflective of the school community. They may provide information in writing and/or speak with parents and carers in person. This will generally occur during the school day.

Parents/carers have opportunities to speak with or write to a member of staff to raise any issue of concern, provide feedback or make suggestions.

Teachers and school staff may not be available to respond immediately, however they will make every effort to respond, generally during school hours, within a reasonable timeframe.

Teaching staff, including principals, are not required to respond to communications outside of their normal working hours.

There is an expectation that communication and all interaction between school staff and parents and carers is mutually respectful.

Verbal and/or physical aggression or threats, offensive language and derogatory comments, whether face to face, over the phone, via email or on social media is unacceptable and will not be tolerated.

School staff are not expected to respond to communication that is unacceptable and these will be referred to the principal or regional office.

### Working together

Student learning is strengthened when staff and parents and carers are actively and positively involved in their education.

By working together, we support the health and wellbeing of our students and help them develop resilience and confidence.

Our collective efforts are aimed at providing safe environments for all and promoting respectful relationships.

### Role of school staff

School staff play a key role in fostering good relationships with parents and carers.

They do this by:

- welcoming and encouraging parents and carers to participate in their children's education
- communicating information and responding to enquiries in a variety of inclusive ways, reflective of the school community
- maintaining professional relationships that are open, honest and respectful
- valuing every family and respecting their differences
- working with parents and carers to identify and promote the individual needs of their children.

### Role of parents and carers

Parents/carers have an important role in helping to create positive learning environments for students.

They do this by:

- treating all members of the school community with respect and dignity
- respecting differences and preferences of others
- supporting school policies and values
- being respectful in their relationships and reinforcing their children's good behaviour
- supporting the activities of their school and
- getting involved where they are able toencouraging their children to respect other students and school staff.

They do this by:




